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PRESIDENT'S REPORT

WE'VE DONE IT! OUR FIRST QUARTER OF A MILLION DOLLARS!

On Friday 26 April our quarter of a millionth dollar was raised from the proceeds of our "Trip to Africa" raffle.

The \$250,000 is all profit from various functions and fund-raising activities and has all been spent on vital anti-poaching equipment for Zimbabwe. This includes items such as 4WD vehicles, 9 reconditioned gear boxes, 6 reconditioned engines, 10 motor bikes, 10 outboard motors and literally tons of spare parts for all of the above. All these items are being used successfully by the staff of Zimbabwe's National Parks to both protect their black rhinos and to capture marauding poachers.

Naturally, we are justly proud of this achievement, and the Executive of SAVE would like to take this opportunity to thank all the various sponsors who have assisted in our fund-raising together with the many volunteers who have helped organize and plan our activities. We are a small Foundation, nearly 4 years old in Australia, and have already, in this space of time, made great inroads into the shopping lists supplied by the Zimbabwe National Parks. We particularly welcome the new initiatives being made in Victoria.

Our readers, especially those in Western Australia, will be relieved to know that, contrary to some State and Commonwealth bodies, SAVE is run in a business-like manner. None of our funds are with Western Women's Financial Services, and neither do we invest in stamp collections or gold bullion! Paper bags

containing \$30,000 in cash are seldom found in this office!

Since our Christmas Newsletter we have held two major promotional activities, a fantastic dinner at Coco's Riverside Restaurant in Perth and a nationwide raffle organized by SAVE (NSW). Both have contributed enormously to our income, bringing in nearly \$40,000. On top of that, there have been some notable individual efforts along the way, and many of our members are selling T-shirts, sweat shirts, and stickers, as well as collecting donations in our small rhino money-boxes. This is a very good on-going form of income and we hope that more SAVE members around Australia will become involved.

An example of the appeal of our T-

shirts is a small picture and write-up that appeared in "Counter Spy" in the Weekend Magazine of The West Australian on 16 March. Over the course of the next four weeks our Perth office was inundated with people coming in to purchase these T-shirts; in fact, over \$3,500 worth was sold in that short period of time, which indicated the level of appeal and concern generated by our products. MORE PRESSURE IN S.E. ASIA

In early May, we welcomed the initiative taken by the World Wildlife Fund for Nature (W.W.F.) who announced that they intend putting heavy pressure on some South East Asian countries, in particular China, Taiwan, South Korea and Thailand, all major importers of rhino horn. It is very important that we try to remove both the market and the demand for horn as it is only in this way that we can take away the motivation for poachers to go after their prey. Let's hope that as much world pressure as possible can be applied in appropriate places so that the risk of extinction of one of the world's oldest mammals is removed.

REPORT FROM MELBOURNE

Man's maltreatment of wild places and the animals which inhabit them, appals me. The attitude that the earth is man's dominion, and its animals expendable chattels, lies at the heart of this maltreatment. In order to turn this around, a whole new way of thinking is required. Meanwhile, urgent action is needed to save those animals most in danger of extinction.

And so, while watching the cricket on television earlier this year, I was interested to hear of an organisation in Australia, campaigning to save the black rhino. A telephone number appeared on the screen, so I jotted it down and later rang it. I spoke to Nicholas Duncan who told me more about SAVE. What really sold me was that SAVE concerns itself with all African endangered wildlife. As I have always loved elephants, and been angered by their sufferings at the hands of hunters of various motives, I became very interested in SAVE.

Nicholas suggested I attend the fund-raising dinner in February, which I had had in mind to do. There, I met some wonderful people who were most helpful. The following day, I visited the SAVE office, and before I knew it, was on my way home - armed with raffle tickets, T-shirts, stickers and things.

Since then, every couple of weeks, I have set up a stall at the Camberwell Sunday market (just near where Jim Calms sells his books and chairs to people). Through this, approximately \$300 has been raised, and many people have enquired about SAVE. As a result, I now have a list of names of people keen to become involved. One of these, Kevin Fourie, is helping to organize a SAVE meeting in Melbourne on 25th. It will be in the Lecture Theatre on the 1st Floor, Stock Exchange Building, 331 Collin Street, Melbourne at 6.15pm. ZIMBABWE UPDATE

During April, Zimbabwe suffered more poaching than at any other time in its history. In a three week period 19 gangs of poachers from Zambia were known to have crossed the Zambezi or Lake Kariba, and entered Zimbabwe illegally to kill black rhinos. Some of these gangs were intercepted by patrols but others got through and continued the slaughter. So far, 8 rhino carcasses have been found, 3 poachers killed and 3 captured. It is known that several poachers escaped back across the Zambezi into Zambia.

We now have 2 Toyota Landcruisers in Zimbabwe, the first purchased last September from general funds and now on patrol in Chirisa. Poaching activity is currently very active in this area and we hope that our new vehicle will play a key role in its containment.

The B.P. mobile workshop, manned by English mechanic Paul Oleszczuk, continues its vital work rehabilitating National Park's vehicles. Paul, who has now been in Zimbabwe for nearly 2 years, is currently financed by London Zoo and Rhino Rescue Trust, and there has been nothing but high praise from all who know of his work. He now has a deputy, Senior Ranger Jura, who also has a Landrover and is able to travel around the parks. Unfortunately, the vehicle is currently being repaired after a crash with a truck driven by a drunk driver!

Earlier this year we made an appeal to

The second Landcruiser was bought from the proceeds of the Rhino Ball in Sydney last year, and has recently arrived in Harare to go on active duty in Chipungu, a newly formed black rhino sanctuary. On the high seas between Tokyo and Durban is our third vehicle, purchased with the proceeds from Coco's, and expected to arrive in early June.

We have also sent many spares, including gear boxes and all manner of parts for Landrover engines. These are being used by Paul and his colleagues to repair many older vehicles which, without their expertise and our help, would remain idle and forgotten.

He had us in stitches for about 20 minutes as he related his experiences in the West Indies and other cricketing countries, but he also reminded us of the urgent need to help preserve Africa's wildlife, highlighting the role that the people of Australia and England can play in this cause. His humour was good-natured, his anecdotes tremendous, his dedication to conservation all too evident, his ability to stir our consciences masterly. Thank you, David, for such a wonderful contribution and for setting the scene for the forthcoming auction.

SAVE President, Nicholas Duncan, read out a letter of appeal from Glenn Tatham, the Chief Warden in Zimbabwe. Glenn referred to the cricketing personalities "who will be batting it out tonight in an attempt to obtain a high score in favour of the rhinos. May we take this opportunity of asking you all to help with this event in knocking the poachers for a six and bowling them all out for a duck".
